Like the Sea itself, the motion and dynamic, the great rise and fall, the moving forward and the receding back... reside in the Soul of the Conductor and the Musicians. But caution. It should never become fast. Because indeed, this languid Prayer is sung or played for "they who go down to the Sea in ships..." and for that reason, and written on 31 July 2014, it is dedicated to the Souls of the USS INDIANAPOLIS.

This 2 verse arrangement may be repeated to allow for 4 full verses with varying orchestrations and intensities. "World Ensemble" works allow for great collaboration between Composer/arranger and Conductor/Musicians.

For instance, the chorus can sing texts or not. There might be no chorus at all, or any combination of Band, Chorus and Orchestra and all of its subsequent "choirs" to be conjoined and explored. On varied sections for example, the conductor may ask only the Clarinet Choir to sustain the hymn, etc. Texts may be spoken over Music... Music played as a backdrop to slides, *Quicktime* movie or any projection, including dance. Much is possible. You are at *Liberty* to join in the crafting and allow this Music to reach the Hearts and Souls of many.

The History of the hymn is fascinating, with much to be found on *Wikipedia*, etc. The original Hymn was most likely inspired by *Psalm 107: 23-26*.
